It would be hard to find a more powerful image of the fun and feel of electric toy trains in the interwar period than this illustration (top) that appears in Electricity Comes to Us. This children's book was written by Rose Wyler and Warren W. McSpadden with pictures by Th. D. Luykx (this name must be a pseudonym!). It was published by Grosset & Dunlap in 1937. Three-rail track and recognizable tinplate trains and accessories cover the floor as a boy engineer works the transformer.

The book's cover shows a GG1-style electric loco pulling a passenger train past a hydroelectric generating station in mountainous terrain. Another illustration inside this beautiful 10- by 9-inch color book shows how to wire a miniature structure for lights.

There is a subtle touch in the style of this book's artwork that anticipates postwar catalog illustration. One picture depicts a Mack Bulldog truck and an early intercity bus crossing a bridge beneath which speeds a Multiple Unit passenger train. A generating plant abuts the tracks and wires on towers and poles run everywhere. The MU train sports a pantograph reaching an overhead wire, but a close inspection of the drawing reveals that this railroad line has been constructed with inside-third-rail track, the dual feeds bringing to mind for this writer a certain New York City showroom layout still a dozen years in the future.
